Professional Certification Requires Maintenance

Happy August, everyone! I hope you all had a wonderful summer and are getting ready to head into the fall with some energy and enthusiasm.

Let's talk about those pesky renewal requirements – professional development hours (PDHs). They aren't in place just to annoy you (even though it might feel that way sometimes), they are there to help ensure that anyone holding

the designation of PTOE, PTP, or RSP is upholding the spirit and letter of the professional certification.

Join me as we look at this through the lens of why you and thousands of others have pursued certification:

Building Trust and Credibility – professional certifications show that individuals and organizations have the knowledge and skills to perform the duties they are required to do; in some instances that includes upholding regulatory requirements. Those professional development hours are proof that you are maintaining that knowledge and those skills—and, in some instances, that you are the right expert to make life-saving decisions.

Improving Safety – speaking of life-saving decisions, many of our certificants are involved in plans, designs, or initiatives that have a direct impact on transportation safety. Those PDHs can often provide you with the latest information and state-of-the-practice strategies to ensure you're properly delivering on that promise to help save lives!

Enhancing Career Opportunities – many employers prioritize candidates with relevant certifications, particularly in specialized areas like safety; and some public agencies require consultants to have staff that maintain certifications in order to work on certain contracts. The reason that prioritization and requirement exists is in recognition of your current abilities. For someone who earned a college degree 20+ years ago, the best way to measure current abilities is through certification, with the understanding that regular maintenance of professional development is a requirement.

Staying Current with Industry Standards – as someone who has been involved in the transportation industry for nearly 40 years, I can tell you with absolute certainty that a LOT has changed. Almost everything I learned early in my career has evolved (naturally as it should) and only through involvement in national committees, conferences, and seminars have I kept pace with this constant evolution.

Someone recently said that certifications are like university degrees – they are considered permanent credentials once earned. I completely disagree with that comparison, because, to me, certifications prove you are currently capable of performing your duties. And it's because of those pesky PDHs that I can say that!

So, keep up with your professional development, stay current, and you'll definitely get a return on that investment!

Certification Matters: Summer News from TPCB



On July 9, your TPCB Board held its second scheduled meeting of the year, which took place virtually. It was a productive session where we reviewed and discussed progress on the following certification and exam updates:

- The Professional Transportation Planner (PTP) exam update, which was completed in late 2024. The updated and new exam questions were first used during the February 2025 exam sitting.
- The Road Safety Professional Level 1 (RSP1) exam update, which we began last year and expect to complete by the end of 2025. We're on track to implement the updated and new questions for the February 2026 exam sitting.

On the administrative side, we reviewed and approved the audited 2024 financial statements, received an update comparing our 2025 budget to actual expenses and revenues, looked at certification numbers, trends, and renewals, and approved the 2025–2030 Strategic Plan.

One of our ongoing goals is to ensure that our certification programs remain both current and relevant —and to identify new programs where there's a clear need. In that spirit, I'm pleased to share a few initiatives your TPCB Board is currently planning and exploring:

- In late fall 2025, we'll begin the process of updating the Road Safety Professional Level 2 (RSP 2) exam for both the Behavioral and Infrastructure Specialty tracks.
- Over the past year, we've been exploring the potential to build on our successful RSP1 and RSP2 certifications by developing a Road Safety Auditor (RSA) certification—either independently or in partnership with another organization. Interest in this type of certification has been strong. At our fall board meeting on September 30, we'll hear a presentation by former TPCB Director Geni Bahar, who chaired the subcommittee we established to explore this opportunity. She'll share the committee's findings and recommendations with the Board.

Thank you again for your continued support and your commitment to advancing the transportation profession through certification. TPCB Board Member Profile

Pamela O'Brien, P.E., PTOE – Organizational Director

TPCB: Tell us a little more about where you currently work and what you do in your day-to-day job.

O'BRIEN: I am a senior traffic engineer at DKS Associates, where I have worked for 18.5 years. My main focus is traffic signal systems and traffic signal timings. As a consultant, I help cities, counties, and state agencies develop optimal solutions related to traffic signal operations. I have provided systems engineering services to assist agencies in evaluating and selecting new local and central traffic signal systems and Automated Traffic Signal Performance Measures (ATSPM) systems based on their needs



and constraints. I also do a lot of work evaluating and developing new coordinated signal timings, including managing data collection, creating Synchro models, developing new timings, and working hand-in- hand with the agencies to program and field review the new timings. I estimate that I have developed timings for more than 1,500 traffic signals in my career and have worked with almost every local controller firmware in operation. Each project is a fun puzzle to solve, and no two days are ever alike.

TPCB: What first inspired you to pursue your certification?

O'BRIEN: I received my civil engineering P.E. license early in my career, as do many other civil engineer grads. When I learned about the PTOE certification, I thought it would set me apart as a professional focused on traffic operations and not just general civil engineering, especially as a consultant.

TPCB: What are you most looking forward to while serving on the TPCB Board?

O'BRIEN: I look forward to learning more about how the governance board operates and providing input from my perspective as a practicing traffic engineering consultant. I also am looking forward to meeting and working with the other board members from across the United States and Canada who have different career focuses.

TPCB: How does certification help transportation practitioners advance their careers?

O'BRIEN: Transportation practitioners arrive in their careers via many different routes. Some have civil engineering backgrounds, some have electrical engineering backgrounds, some have planning backgrounds. The TPCB certifications are a way to take those varied backgrounds and provide recognition of knowledge in specific areas, whether it be traffic operations, transportation planning, or road safety. Although certification is voluntary, it demonstrates that you, as a professional, have taken the initiative to be tested and can validate your specialized knowledge and skills. This goes a long way with employers and clients as a person advances in their career.



Future Certification Exam Periods and Application Deadlines

Computer-based exams for PTOE, PTP, and RSP may be taken during the following three time frames:

February 1 to 28, 2026: Applications must be received by midnight, November 20, 2025 **June 1 to 30, 2026:** Applications must be received by midnight, March 20, 2026 **October 1 to 31, 2026:** Applications must be received by midnight, July 20, 2026 For a list of available exam cities, please visit this **link.**

Once you have followed the page, make sure to add your certifications to your profile. Here's how to do it. (Hint: it's EASY!)

Step 1: Go to your LinkedIn profile.

Step 2: Scroll down to "Add license or certification."

Step 3: Click on + to add.

Step 4: Under Name, start typing the name or initials of the certification. It should automatically populate. Or, if it doesn't pre-populate, copy and paste from the following:

- Professional Traffic Operations Engineer (PTOE)
- Professional Transportation Planner (PTP)
- Road Safety Professional, Level 1 (RSP1)
- Road Safety Professional, Level 2 Behavioral (RSP2B)
- Road Safety Professional, Level 2 Infrastructure (RSP2I)

Similarly, under the Issuing Organization, if you begin typing TPCB, the organization should populate.
